

A “Let’s Talk” session is a Q&A discussion between students and Mike Domitrz. The entire session is driven by the questions your students submit to Mike in advance and by the questions they ask live during the session. Here is how to request and collect the questions for Mike to address:

2 OPTIONS for COLLECTING QUESTIONS:

Online:

If you would like us to collect the students’ questions, we can provide a link to an online survey for your students to submit their question to. Email Mike at mike@centerforrespect.com if you’d prefer this option.

Onsite:

Many campuses find the best way to have the students submit questions is by doing so in-person IF the campus has an event where all the attending students would be together. If not, this option is not effective. Index cards are handed out to students and the students are given 5 minutes to write down questions they’d like to ask. Every student is asked to submit at least 1 question on the card they get. They can put as many questions as they want on the card. For this exercise, there is no need to have an open discussion of questions (please let that occur at the actual session with Mike). *No names or identifying information should be on the cards.*

Here is a list of questions campuses have said are very helpful for best enabling their students to come up with questions:

- What questions do you have around the sexual pressure students face today?
- What question do you have around sexual pressures or expectations from partners?
- What questions do you have around situations you’ve experienced, heard about, or seen other students make regarding sexual decision making or consent or respecting boundaries?
- What questions do you have pertaining to “hooking up”?
- Do you have any questions as how you feel or don’t feel today’s sexual culture is unfair?
- What do you feel is an area of sexual decision-making that the campus is not addressing that you’d like addressed?
- When the school does programs and/or has classroom discussions around consent and sexual assault, what are elements you feel need to be done better and why?
- What questions do you have around students being pressured into and/or coerced into sexual activity by their partners?
- What are questions you have about intervening on behalf of another student when alcohol or other drugs are being used to facilitate a sexual assault (example: getting someone drunk to get them alone to “hook-up”)?
- If you were to ask a question about sexting or sending nudes, what would that question be?
- If you were to ask a question about pornography, what would that question be?
- Is there any element of the sexual culture and/or expectations within the campus’s culture that concerns you? If so, please share in the form of a question.
- What questions do you have regarding creating mutually amazing sexual experiences and/or mutually amazing relationships?
